Showcasing our School on all levels

Once again it has been a busy week in the school as we welcomed over 750 guests on Monday morning for an Open Event for Year 7 and last night held our Sixth Form Open Evening, which was extremely well attended. We hope that current parents were able to leave with a full picture of everything that is on offer in our Sixth Form - the huge variety of academic courses (A Level, BTECs and EPQ) and extra-curricular opportunities that are available for all our students. It was great to welcome so many parents back into the building to see the Sixth Form Centre with its menu sampling and Costa Coffee bar. We were particularly proud of Head Boy, **Dereiss**, Head Girl **Lydia** and Prefect **Olivia** who all took to the stage to talk so articulately and confidently to a large audience. We have already had feedback from many of the parents that they were moved by the speeches and felt huge admiration for the students who handled the event with calm and self-assurance.

Lydia spoke about many of the trips, activities and opportunities to travel abroad with the school. She also discussed the chances to get involved in sport and music and talked about reaching out beyond the school community, "One of the great facets of our Sixth Form is that you get a chance to become really involved in the school community as well as the wider community issues. There is something for everyone to get involved in. In previous years, we have taken part in a 5K fun run and over 100 of us took part in a netball tournament raising funds for the

Young Minds mental health charity."

Dereiss (pictured) spoke emotively about his personal experience at the school, focusing on the rapport he has established with key teachers, "Relationships with teachers are not just always about academic progress but about having someone who you can talk to. When teachers make the effort to care and help students, these students become more capable of growth. The standard of teaching here at Saint Cecilia's is second to none, with teachers who are not only passionate about the subjects they teach, but about the students who learn from them."

Olivia, who joined the Sixth Form from Lady Margaret School, spoke about how easy the transition was for her and said, "Since joining Saint Cecilia's, the school has really helped me grow as an independent individual, has treated me with great respect and given me the opportunity to help improve the school for all students. For example, by becoming a Sixth Form prefect, I have been able to involve myself with school life and have the ability to contribute new ideas to the student body."

We hope that many students will follow in their footsteps in years to come.


