Athletics - success at the ESSA Cup Competition

On Tuesday 17th May, selected pupils in Years 7-10 competed at the first round of the English School's Association Athletics (ESAA) schools' cup competition at the Linford Christie Stadium in west London. We had over 54 pupils compete in this team competition, more than any other school at the event. It was a huge success for both individuals and as a school team.

Overall results:

Year 7 and 8 Girls team won—1st place! Year 7 and 8 Boys - 2nd place Year 9 and 10 Boys won—1st place! Year 9 and 10 girls were 3rd.



These are great results against 10 other schools, including Wimbledon High School and St Pauls Girls' School.

This means two of our teams have potentially qualified for the next round of this national competition. It was a fantastic day for our athletes at Saint Cecilia's. Well done to all!

Year 9 Duke of Edinburgh's Award Bronze Expedition





Year 10 Art and Textiles Trip

On Tuesday 17th and Wednesday 18th May, Year 10 Art and Design and Art Textiles groups visited London's Embankment and Tate Modern for the launch of their new Order and Disorder project, which is worth 60% of their final GCSE grade. The trips were an opportunity for pupils to collect evidence to show research and development for their new project. Pupils were given a set of activities to help them explore the world around the Embankment in drawings and photos. One of their main missions was to complete a handmade sketchbook with quick sketches of the day, including views across the Thames and from the bridges, nature, the different building structures and anything that inspired them linked to the theme of Order and Disorder. We also explored relevant artworks in Tate Modern to sketch and analyse.

Ms Mulvey, Ms England, Miss Bernard, Mrs Toneva and I noticed our artists engaged throughout the entire trip. Pupils took every opportunity to be inspired – looking around for something to sketch whilst sitting on the train, spotting photo opportunities en route to the gallery through fence gaps, between buildings and from interesting vantage points. We returned to school as enthused as they were, and we'd like to thank them for engaging with the trips and making the days so enjoyable and useful.
