




Year 9 exceptional scientists

Year 8



Virtual pilots take to the skies

A group of intrepid pupils from Years 7, 8 and 9 have been learning to fly high performance jet aircraft at Aerospace Club. Many have already completed their first take-off and landing. However flying these aircraft is not without its risks, several pilots have been forced to eject! The pupils have been familiarising themselves with the many switches and instruments in the 3D cockpit, a mixture of digital displays and analogue gauges. There are a vast number of keyboard commands to remember as well as checklists. Recently the pupils have been learning to start up the aircraft from a cold and dark state.

The study level flight simulator has been a huge challenge for the pupils, but there is a great spirit of cooperation amongst the club members. The dedication of the pupils who returned to the club this term has been fantastic. Incredibly most of the flying has been done without joysticks.

Aerospace Club is a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) project open to all year groups. We meet every Tuesday (early) lunchtime 12:15 -12:45 and after school on Thursdays 15:15 - 16:45 in room 1.16b.


