# **Linguists Leading by Example**

Last week Year 11 pupils had the opportunity to listen to two women who have excelled in their careers primarily due to their linguistic ability.

Celia Fernández Luján is a humanitarian lawyer who has lived in different countries over the past seven years, including Iraq for two years and Belgium, working for the European Parliament. She is fluent in German, Dutch, French, Spanish, English and Catalan. She is now working as an Analyst, helping create an evacuation plan for the workers in Ukraine for Booking.com due to the rising tensions with Russia.

Carina Liew is a successful director of an investment company and is fluent in French, English, Chinese, Italian and has a basic knowledge of Spanish. Some of the pupils are interested in careers in finance and banking and were surprised to find out how important it is to speak different languages in this sector.

Both women were an inspiration to our Year 11 pupils. I was pleased when they told me how inspired they felt and how watching those videos made them want to revise harder for their Spanish exams.

We have also been able to record Celia and she answered some of the questions in the lesson such as:

- What was the hardest language you learnt and why?
- How did you adapt to so many different cultures?
- How did you get your job and how did speaking different languages help you get to the position you are now?

### **National Reference Test 2022**

We have been chosen by Ofqual to run two one-hour tests in English Language and Maths on the 1<sup>st</sup> March. English will be at 8.50am (P1) and Maths will be at 11.10am (P3) in the Chapel. The pupils (Year 11) have been randomly selected by the NFER staff. The pupils do not need to prepare for the test and the results are anonymised and are not provided to schools or pupils. The results are used by exam boards when setting grade boundaries and are also important to Ofqual and schools to understand the impact of COVID-19 on learning. We will be writing home to inform parents of pupils who have been selected.

### **Centre Assessed Grades**

As you will be aware, in the summers of 2020 and 2021, schools had to award grades for Year 11 and Year 13 students as public examinations were cancelled due to the pandemic. It is intended that the public exams for summer 2022 will take place as planned, however the Government has issued guidelines for schools in the event that exams are cancelled and Centre Assessed Grades (grades submitted by schools) are required again.

The guidelines require us to carry out three formal assessments per subject. These assessments will be completed in the classroom. Pupils and students entitled to extra time or other exam access arrangements will have these in place for the assessments. Teachers will prepare pupils and students by giving them clear guidelines on the topics/content of the assessment and they will only be assessed on topics/content that they have already been taught.

It is our intention to carry out these formal assessments in three windows as indicated below. Pupils and students will sit a 45-minute paper in each of their subjects during each of these formal assessment windows. The topics included in the assessments will be shared with pupils and students in advance.

Even if these formal assessments are not used for the submission of grades, they will be useful for teachers, pupils and students to identify which areas require focus in the run up to the summer exams.

Teachers will share the marked formal assessments with pupils and students, and they will be able to see where they did well and what they need to work on.

I would like to reiterate that it is very likely that exams will proceed as normal in the summer, though it is important that pupils and students approach these formal assessments thinking that the result may well be used to make a judgement on their final grade.
