

#### French Politics



One of the criteria of the A Level French course is that students must keep abreast of current affairs in France and in the French-speaking world. Year 13 are currently learning about crime and the French prison system, whilst Year 12 are currently studying La Haine, an independent French film which won numerous awards at various film festivals.

Both themes were an excellent opportunity to discuss French politics and the current situation in the French overseas regions of Guadeloupe and Martinique. Students were given QR codes, which they scanned on their phones in order to access a range of sources reporting on the issues. France 24 reported: "Unrest on the island of Guadeloupe erupted last week over curbs imposed by Paris, including the mandatory vaccination of health workers and health pass rules. On Saturday, Paris authorities deployed

200 extra police officers, including elite police commandos after pharmacies and shops were looted and vehicles torched. Police arrested 38 people overnight Sunday for breaking a night time curfew. Two security forces were injured. Thirty people appeared in court on Monday for allegedly participating in the unrest. President Emmanuel Macron has said the violence over COVID-19 restrictions had created a 'very explosive' situation, but some members of the opposition say it was predictable." The unrest and riots have been going on for three weeks and have now extended to the island of Martinique. France is to deploy 75 more agents from the GIGN special forces to Guadeloupe and Martinique. This is what some of our Sixth Formers had to say about this issue:

Adrien, Year 13 argued: Guadeloupeans no longer trust the French Government because they feel neglected by Paris. The mandatory health pass is not the only issue the people are protesting against. They are also protesting against poverty, marginalisation, social and racial inequalities, as well as the lack of drinking water in some parts of the islands — all issues that the French government has failed to solve for many years. Nothing was done to encourage vaccine uptake, and instead healthcare professionals and firefighters are being sacked for refusing to take the vaccine. I don't think that the protesters and rioters deserve prison sentences; I think community work would be more appropriate in those circumstances.

**Natalie**, Year 12 put forward: The situation in Guadeloupe is reminiscent of what is happening in the film La Haine. The overall view is that the people feel that they are being silenced and controlled by the Government, and the authorities are not communicating with them. There is a mix of distrust of the government and fake news, which is why only 1/3 of Guadeloupeans are vaccinated against COVID despite the vaccine being widely available on the island. The lack of trust in the Government dates back from the chlordecone scandal in the 1990s, when the French Government continued using this very harmful pesticide in the banana plantations in Guadeloupe and Martinique despite knowing the risks and after they had stopped using it in mainland France. This pesticide has been found responsible for the high rates of cancers on both islands; Guadeloupe and Martinique have the highest rates of prostate cancer in the world!

Let's keep the people of Guadeloupe and Martinique in our prayers, hoping that calm and peace finally comes back to these paradisiacal islands.



## **Line Drawing Winner**










## **Christmas Dinner - Sign Up!**


