Sam in Year 10, has written and published his own book.



Science Club Acids in Action

Year 7 and Year 8 learnt about acids, alkalis and neutralisation in Science club this week. After creating their own neutralisation circles, they worked as a team to try to create the pH scale using only sodium hydroxide and hydrochloric acid.

Dissection in the lab

Year 10 have been learning about the cardiovascular system. They were able to view cross-sections of arteries and veins under the microscope and got their hands on lamb's hearts during their dissections in their Science lessons this week.





They were able to compare arteries and veins. They found that arteries have a much thicker muscular wall and a narrower lumen (left image) than veins (right image)

Pupils had to identify the coronary arteries that run across the surface of the heart to deliver blood, oxygen and nutrients to the heart tissue itself. These are much smaller when contrasted with the large arteries (the aorta and pulmonary artery) coming from the heart itself.




Front view of the external surface of the heart. Coronary arteries running diagonally across the surface.

Pupils then dissected the heart to see the atria, valves, chordae tendineae and ventricles. They noted the much larger left ventricle (below left) that pumps blood around the body vs. the right ventricle which is much less muscular (below right).
